## Norman Adams (1927 - 2005)

Path Through The Wood Watercolour and pencil, 1957 38 x 43cm

In 1955 Norman and his wife Anna bought Butts Cottage, a beautiful Yorkshire farm house at the foot of Pen-Y-Ghent, where they spent much of the next fifty years together. In 1962 they paid their first regular visit to the west coast of Scotland, spending several months each year living in a remote cottage on the island of Scarp.

Captivated by both the Yorkshire and Scottish landscape, Norman Adams left an incredible visual diary of his life, through the multitude of beautiful watercolours produced over a period of 50 years. This exhibition documents the development of his landscape watercolour paintings work and his constant fascination with the land, and ever-changing Northern light.
